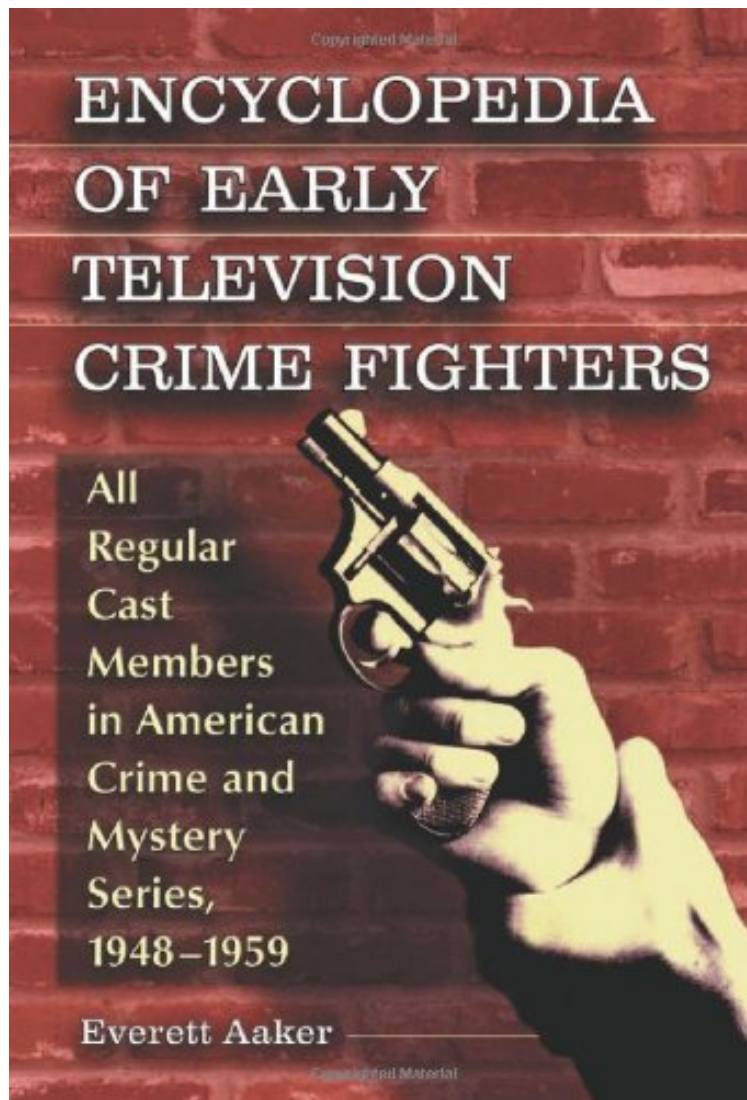

This book was a terrific buy when it was originally published by McFarland in hardback. Now it has been reprinted by McFarland in a special two volume softback edition which represents even better value for money. I venture to suggest that author Everett Aaker has his facts correct which is more than can be said for the alibis put forward by the villains who populated these series when confronted by the intrepid heroes and heroines covered in this book. PooleThis Encyclopedia of Early Television Crime Fighters consists of biographies plus credits of a few hundred television players who appeared in crime series on American television during the fifties. What most impressed me about this book is that the details of the series and the part played by an individual actor are inserted in the body of text,so that the reader gains an insight into an actor's whole career. These biographies are frequently as exciting as episodes of the series themselves. The book is obviously intended as a companion to these series. Many of the players went on to have long and successful careers. It is easily possible to imagine that one is back in the days when these shows were first shown on television. The book is a well written, beautifully produced, lavishly illustrated softback in two volumes and makes for an easy, informative read. Well done!

Any episode of a crime or mystery series involves some or all of the following: the perpetration of a crime; its investigation; the analytical process which involves the determination of the villain; the arrest and trial of the culprit; and the handing out of the appropriate punishment. Such series involving the exploits of a wide variety of courageous heroes and heroines were very popular during the 1950s, and they featured a host of actors and actresses, including famous television detectives (e.g., Raymond Burr), those famous in other genres (e.g., Boris Karloff, Charles Bronson), and over 250 other players with recurring roles. This reference work lists every player who had a regular role in a crime or mystery series during the early era of television. All covered series offered live or filmed episodes of a crime or mystery nature, and all were shown on American television. All series had either regular stars or a recognizable host. Entries cover the player's real name, family information and education; how the player originally broke into show business; the player's career preceding the series; and his or her marriage, children, death date, and film and television credits. Appendices provide a catalog of American mystery series and a list of regular mystery series players whose roles began after December 31, 1959.
