Mr Runciman is extraordinarily opinionated and full of himself, and looks down on most of Haydn's music, other than the London symphonies, as really not very good at all; as for The Creation, The Seasons, and all of Haydn's church music, he states that "it is a pity he touched church music. However, it is easily

forgotten, and will be some day." You get the drift! On the other hand, the book is well written, even though cranky and very opinionated and, since it is a free download and only some 55 pages long, worth reading so long as you don't take Mr Runciman's flawed and patronizing evaluation of Haydn too seriously.3 of 3 people found the following review helpful.
