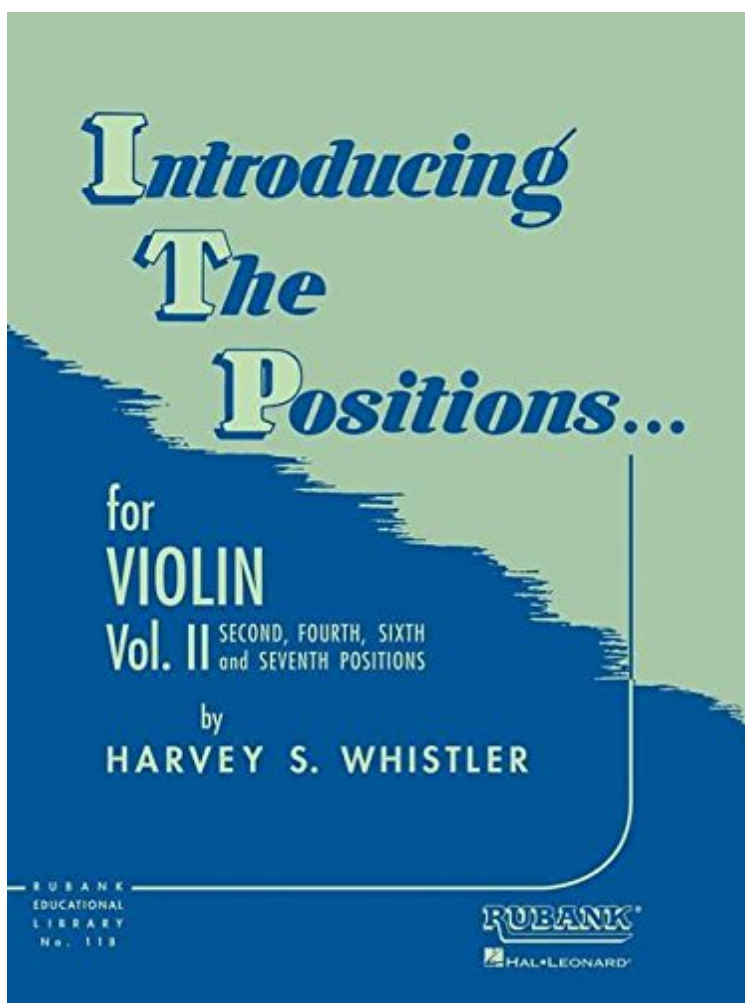


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Introducing the Positions for Violin: Volume 2 - Second, Fourth, Sixth and Seventh (Rubank Educational Library)
